**Daniel Beaty to Perform One-Man Play**

The Frederick Douglass Institute (FDI) at Mansfield University will present Daniel Beaty and his one-man play *Emergence-See!* on Tuesday, September 18, at 7 p.m. in Straughn Hall. The performance is free and open to the public.

In the play a slave ship rises out of the Hudson River in front of the Statue of Liberty, sending the nation into a whirlwind of emotion and exploration in this explosive solo tour de force featuring slam poetry, multi-character transformation, and song.

The provocative performance explores many questions such as Beaty portrays a cast of 40 characters including a homeless man, a scientist, a republican business executive, a street vendor and an 11-year old boy from the projects who all respond to the phenomenon.

A slam poet named Rodney is scheduled to perform in a poetry slam that evening, but is delayed by having to retrieve his schizophrenic father from the site of the ship's rising. While Rodney and his brother go to see about their dad, the audience is treated to the poetry slam already in progress.

Through the characters individual responses to the ship and their varied testimonies on identity and personal freedom, *Emergence-See!* weaves a stirring commentary on modern black life.

*The New York Times* calls *Emergence-See!* "A dazzling 90 minutes, full of memorable moments, intense, hilarious."

An actor, singer, writer, and composer, Beaty has worked throughout the U.S., Europe, and Africa in a variety of styles ranging from television to solo concerts to theatrical productions to opera including performance at The White House, The Kennedy Center in tribute to Ruby Dee and Ossie Davis, and The Apollo.

His long list of awards includes the 2007 Obie Award for Outstanding Writing and Performance, and 2006 Ovation, Acclaim, & Everyday Freedom Hero Awards. Daniel is also the 2004 Grand Slam Champion at the Nuyorican Poet's Café and The Fox Networks National Redemption Slam Champion.

### **Music & Dance of Argentina Coming to Campus**

The Mansfield University “Flute in the Limelight” Series will present the Tami Tango Trio for three events on September 19-20. All events are free and open to the public.

The trio, consisting of Eduardo Tami on flute, Federico Perez playing piano and Pablo Fauaz on guitar, accompanied by dancers Maria Claudia Marciano and Lucien Gerard Mares, will perform two concerts and teach a class in tango.

On Wednesday, September 19 at 8:45 p.m., a tango class will be held in Steadman Theatre. No experience is necessary but class size will be limited. Call (570)662-4726 to reserve a spot in the class.

On Thursday, September 20 at 1 p.m. in Steadman Theatre, a 50-minute performance will feature the music, dance and history of Argentina. Several MU faculty will appear as guest artists.

Thursday evening at 8 p.m. in Straughn Hall, the ensemble will give a performance featuring the music and dance of Argentina and the history and evolution of the tango.

Since 2002, Argentinean flutist Eduardo Tami has performed tangos, milongas, vales and candombes as part of “A Dedo y a Pulmón,” a tango duet whose name is created based on a pun that makes reference to the use of lungs and fingers that these two instruments basically need to be executed.

Tami has recorded a total of six CDs with both groups and has toured the U.S. and Latin America many times. As part of his tour he includes how the music and history of Argentina are inextricably bound together.

Christine Moulton, assistant professor of Music and “Flute in the Limelight” Series organizer, says the purpose of the series is “to bring professional flutists from a variety of musical disciplines to Mansfield for concerts, educational presentations, workshops and lessons.”

Moulton adds that planning is underway to bring MU flute students to area elementary, middle and high schools for concerts, demonstrations and clinics in an effort to enhance music education in north-central Pennsylvania and south-central New York.

### **PR Department Wins Apex Award**

The Mansfield University Public Relations Department has received an Award of Excellence in the 19th annual Apex Awards for Publications Excellence competition. The award was given for the department’s podcast marketing campaign.

The campaign was conducted during the 2006-07 academic year. “Podcasting was so new that we felt we had to aggressively market our program, not only to let people know about it but to educate them about this new form of communication,” Director of Public Relations Dennis Miller said.

The campaign included news stories, magazine ads, radio ads, billboards, post cards, and business cards. The program was also highlighted in several magazine and professional journal articles, as well as two Associated Press articles.

“Mansfield University’s podcasting received a lot of national and international attention,” Miller said, adding that Mansfield was the first university in the world to use podcasting as a method of recruiting students.

The shows attract an average of 4,000 listeners a week from 26 countries around the world, including a large listener base in China.

**E. Scott Ryan**, Criminal Justice, was invited to announce the Canadian release of his book *Therapeutic Justice to Forensic Counseling* at the Royal Canadian Military Institute in Toronto, ONT recently. In his book, Ryan analyses the errors and abuses of the medical models in corrections. He proposes a new criminal rationality based forensic counseling approach. *Therapeutic Justice to Forensic Counseling* and Ryan’s five other criminology books are available on Amazon.com. Also, Ryan’s articles on metaphysical criminology

appear in a special monograph of *Contemporary Philosophy*. Ryan's philosophic-criminological debate with Adrian Pabst of Cambridge University on the "nature of evil ultimate criminality" resulted in the formation of the Society for Metaphysical and Criminological Analysis and Application.

**John Ulrich**, English & Modern Languages, presented his paper, "Confessions of Two Dangerous Minds: Thomas Carlyle and Chuck Barris," on July 13 at Villanova University's 2007 Carlyle Studies Conference.

**K. Sue Young**, Communication & Theatre, and **Howard P. Travis**, emeritus, recently published the second edition of *Oral Communication: Skills, Choices, and Consequences* with Waveland Press. They have another book in nonverbal communication coming out later this year.

## SPORTS UPDATE

The MU field hockey squad, ranked seventh in the STX/NFHCA Division II National Coaches Poll, will be home twice in the week ahead. Fourth ranked IUP comes to Spalding Field for a noon start on Saturday. East Stroudsburg visits on Wednesday at 4 p.m.

MU is 4-0 after beating Bryant 5-3 on Sunday and topping Millersville 4-2 on Wednesday.

The women's soccer team will visit Millersville on Saturday and then come home to take on Clarion on Wednesday. Game time is 4 p.m.

The Mountaineers are 1-1-1, 1-1-0 in the PSAC East, after scoring their first-ever win over Kutztown, 2-1 on Monday.

Lyndi Keiser was named PSAC East Women's Soccer Player of the Week for her outstanding performance during the first week of the 2007 season. Keiser scored both goals in the Mountaineers at Kutztown and has three for the season. Already the Mountaineers all-time leading scorer, she became the first player in school history to net 20 career goals with her second tally in the Kutztown game.

The cross county teams have this weekend off. The Mountaineers travel to Kenosha, WI next weekend to compete in the Mid-West Collegiate Invitational.

Last Saturday, the MU men and women scored team victories at the Oneonta Early Bird Invitational

The men's squad, led by Chris Cummings, placed eight runners in the top 10. Cummings took first, finishing with a time of 19:31 over the 6k course. Josh Wooten (19:47) and Dave Sanford (19:51) took third and fourth respectively.

Freshman Brenae Edwards won in her first-ever collegiate race, finishing the 4.5K course in a time of 17:51.
